Approximately 85 million adults (greater than 1 in 3) have cardiovascular disease; more than 43 million adults age 60 and older are impacted. Additionally, about two-thirds of cardiovascular disease-related deaths occur in people age 75 and older.

The <u>ABCS of Heart Health</u>, brought to you by the <u>Center for Disease</u> <u>Control</u> and <u>Million Hearts</u>, is an easy-to-remember mnemonic and tried-and-true method for the older adults in your life to take care of their heart health.

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## PARTNER HIGHLIGHTS

#### AMPLIFYING AGING: THE NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY AZ-GWEP MSW FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM



NAU's Department of Social Work is excited to announce the creation of the Arizona Geriatrics Workforce Enhancement Program (AZ-GWEP) MSW Fellowship. Beginning in Fall 2024, the AZ-GWEP MSW Fellowship is awarded annually to 3 NAU Master of Social Work (MSW) students committed to developing social work practice skills to work with older adults and pursue careers in aging. Students awarded a fellowship receive a \$1,500 stipend. The goal of the AZ-GWEP MSW Fellowship is to educate and train the primary care and geriatrics workforces and other appropriate specialties to provide age-friendly and dementia-friendly care for older adults in integrated geriatrics and primary care sites/delivery systems using the Age-Friendly Health Systems Framework.

Drawing on the expertise of faculty with aging focused research and practice experience, including Dr. Michael McCarthy and Dr. Megan McCoy, and with support from our Social Work Field Education staff, we are partnering with existing field placement sites and building relationships with new community partners to provide aging related field experiences for MSW students in Northern Arizona. The fellowship is for one year and is integrated into our existing MSW field placement model. Students in eligible rural or tribal placement sites complete a field placement, eight weeks of which is specifically focused on older adults. Students work closely with their agency field supervisor as they gain valuable practice experience. There is a benefit for field supervisors as well, who receive a \$500 stipend for their time in supporting the fellow's GWEP placement.

In Fall 2024, we welcomed our first AZ-GWEP MSW Fellow. Both the student and their field supervisor participate in the AZ-GWEP Advances in Aging lecture series and apply the Age-Friendly Health Systems Framework to practice. Additionally, AZ-GWEP the MSW fellows participate in mentoring sessions with NAU social work faculty and engage in aging specific course content through SW623: Mental Health Practice with Adults & Older Adults. There are plans for the development of a future aging related "conversations" webinar series highlighting the work of NAU faculty and graduate students focused on aging and potential for future interdisciplinary collaborations as the AZ-GWEP MSW Fellowship Program continues to evolve.

About NAU Social Work: The Department of Social Work is part of NAU's College of Social and Behavioral Sciences. NAU offers a Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) program both online and in-person at our Flagstaff, AZ and Yuma, AZ locations, an in-person Advanced Standing Master of Social Work Program (MSW) at our Flagstaff campus, and both a one-year advanced standing and a two-year online MSW program. NAU Social Work Department has a longstanding tradition of community service and preparing competent professional social workers for generalist practice with Native Americans, Latinos, and disenfranchised and vulnerable populations of the Southwest. NAU became a federally designated
