BANNER ALZHEIMER'S INSTITUTE





Alzheimer's disease is a common neurodegenerative disease that poses a huge social and economic burden on patients, families and for society at large. The number of people with Alzheimer's disease is expected to increase to 12.7 million by 2050. Primary care providers are often on the frontline and most

are not comfortable diagnosing and treating dementia, prompting referrals to a specialist. We have a shortage of dementia specialists able to provide comprehensive care required for all people and families living with dementia.

Project ECHO is a tele-mentoring program designed to bring community providers and specialists together to improve outcomes. Project ECHO's mission is to democratize medical knowledge and bring best clinical practices to people all over the world. The story of Project ECHO began in 2003 when Dr. Sanjeev Arora, a liver disease specialist, was frustrated that he could serve only a fraction of the hepatitis C patients needing care. He made it his mission to increase access to effective liver disease care by developing a free educational model, mentoring community providers across New Mexico. This model proved effective, showing disease-related outcomes by ECHO-trained community providers was similar to care provided by specialists.

Banner Alzheimer's Institute (BAI) partnered with Project ECHO in creating the BAI Dementia ECHO. This was made possible due to philanthropic support from the Edson family. It supports BAI in meeting our goal setting a new national standard of care by widely disseminating dementia care best practices and supporting local providers. The program has trained over 500 providers across Arizona helping them improve quality of care to patients with dementia and their families.

Dementia ECHO series consists of twelve sessions over a 6-month period. Each session includes a didactic addressing an area of best practice in dementia care, followed by case presentations and discussion. Participants are strongly encouraged to submit their own cases for review to take advantage of the opportunity to apply knowledge acquired and collaborate with specialists on difficult cases. We seek feedback from participants through surveys assessing confidence, knowledge, and attitude regarding dementia at pre and post program to help us evaluate the program.

There is no cost to participate in the program, CME and CEU credits are available. We are actively seeking multidisciplinary providers to participate in our ECHO as we expand to elevate the standard of care for people and families living with dementia.

Dr. McCoy's scholarship addresses the intersection of aging with health equity for older adults, specifically in LGBTQ+ communities, and the potential for community-based settings to function as identity-affirming spaces which promote resilience. Her current projects include AZALEA which is a community-based participatory approach to building LGBTQ2S+ aging equity in Arizona, a policy analysis of LGBTQ+

inclusion in state plans on aging, and the Northern Arizona Memory Study, which involves partnerships with senior centers in Northern Arizona to support brain health. Hobbies/interests include playing guitar, sports, and creative writing. She is excited to be involved with the AZ-GWEP and to support the next generation of social workers trained to work with older adults!

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
